



HOW TO TAKE ACTION

1. You have three members of Congress who represent you at the federal level:
 - Two Senators and
 - One representative (House Member)
2. Identify these three people and find two phone number for each:
 - Go to www.congress.gov/contact-us to find those three people and their DC office phone number. (It will start with 202)
 - Click on each person's website then generally you can go to contact and then office locations, you will find a phone number for the local office closest to you.
 - Don't forget to grab their email address too.
3. Save this information in your phone for ease of use next time. Call the DC number first. If it's busy, then call the local number.
4. Email the letter AND make a phone call.

Legislators count the number of emails and phone calls they receive from constituents. Your voice matters and your opinions count.

As professionals dedicated to expanding sustainable homeownership and fair housing opportunities, we believe this legislation strengthens—not complicates—the integrity of our housing system. It reinforces the principle that equal access to housing is a civil right.

CALL SCRIPT
